- Mowing List: begin circulation early (March-April) in order to be ready for May.
- Field Opening: get a group together to take everything out of storage, signs up, road maintenance, etc.
- Tractor: general maintenance, sometimes more when required. Oil change, coolant checks, stabilizer in gas for winter, battery removal for winter storage, grease.
- Buildings: periodically require repair and paint. Typically performed during field opening.
- Misc. Storage: anything that typically shouldn't be left at the field during the winter ends up in the Field Chairman's garage/basement (tractor battery, buddy boxes, etc.)
- Expenses: keep track of supplies (lumber, paint, gas, etc. and submit to treasurer...fully reimbursable)
- Field Winterizing

I may have missed a few things but hopefully you get the idea. I would like to thank everyone who has supported myself and the club in all field activities during my tenure.

Somehow the elevator connection on Art Riegal's Seamaster let go, and the resulting nose dive into the lake destroyed the plane. The post-mortem did reveal the cause of the crash, so that source can be eliminated in future projects. Sunday was a rain out. With rain still coming down hard about 10:30, we met at the campsite and had the drawings for prizes. Everyone there went home with merchandise worth well in excess of their registration fee. Again, thanks to Dave Lewis for getting such great prizes. About 11:00 the rain stopped and the sun came out for a while, so 3 pilots again

took to the air.

Dick Allen borrowed the last of my 2 cycle fuel to put in one flight. Ron McGrath flew his Cub several times, and a newcomer put his new Cub in the air a couple times. On his second flight one of the floats came loose from it's front mounting and flopped down. Combat Meet

The day started very poorly, with over an inch of rain the night before I figured we would see no contestants for this years combat meet. I debated calling Terry and canceling the food as I watched it rain Friday. Saturday morning I got up and loaded the planes in the van then put my OUPs and Crasher videos in just in case we were there by ourselves for the day. About 9:15 I started to get phone calls, from pilots that they were coming. The pilots started arriving and soon we had four scale entries and ten open class B entries signed up. The clouds were low and it was windy and we had more pilots than I've seen since my first combat meet. Go figure!

I encouraged everyone to fly their planes and be happy with them before we started. I had run my plane just two weeks ago in the Endless Mountain combat meet (run by Bill Tozer) so I was confident I was ready. After everyone tested their planes, I told everyone to get ready for the first heat and started to get my plane ready. When I hit the button to fill the fuel tank, I got a stream of fuel coming out the front cowl of my plane. I had to decide, go to plane number two (extremely fast, to the point of not keeping its streamer on) or fix plane number one. I set about fixing my fuel line on plane number one as Bill ran round one. For the start of round two I was ready, but as soon as my plane left the catapult the engine sagged then died. So I watched the second round as my plane sat just out of reach on the runway. For round three I finally got in the air! Against Dan R flying a Coroplast Corsair, George Hartman flying a P-51D, and a Coroplast Yak 9. It was obvious that I was way behind the curve, everyone else had gotten the jitters out in rounds one and two and I was stick slammin'. Round three ended with no streamers lost, but in round four Dan, a rookie, impressed me with how much he had learned in just seven sorties. I was on his tail and gaining fast when he dove to the runway, that's my trick (make them aim at me and avoid the ground, and if they can keep up I'm too high), and he lost me. I don't know what is worse having my own moves used against me, or having my son beat me and bring it up (seems like) all the time. But he used my move and was successful with it so good for him. Actually, he added a move I normally go low, fly straight, throttle back and wait for the over shoot knowing that full throttle and a hard left or right bank will get me a streamer as the attacker overshoots. Well Dan just level S turned close to the ground, while purely defensive it worked.

Then the Open class started, Bill Tozer started it off right by getting a streamer early in the first round and keeping his for the entire round. Open is a bit different than scale, the turn radius is much tighter so the furball is much smaller so usually ending with your streamer is an oddity. In scale if one streamer is lost in a round that is a lot. In the second round Bill hit another predator head on putting them both out of action. In round three Jerry Rosco got a ribbon but his throttle servo stopped working so he had to run the plane out of fuel to land; as it proudly displayed the ribbon he had taken. In the last round, when everyone is looking to make up all their points to win and fly with reckless abandon. We had another mid-air forcing one plane down, and everyone remaining lost their streamers in this round.

A good time was had by all! Thanks to the club flyers Bill Tozer, Jerry Rosco, and myself, but most of all thanks to all the members who helped. Because without them we could not do this!

—THE FACTS ABOUT AMA'S INSURANCE—

For Individual Members

Commercial General Liability Coverage (Effective March 31, 2003)

AMA Liability Protection applies to bodily injury or property damage caused by an AMA member. Any AMA member who causes an accident must report that accident promptly to the AMA Head-quarters and complete a written claim report within sixty (60) days.

- Applies to accidents arising from the operation of **model aircraft**, **rockets**, **cars**, **and boats**, in accordance with the AMA NATIONAL Safety Code(s).
- The maximum per occurrence limit of coverage available by this policy is \$2,500,000 involving bodily injury and/or property damage with an overall limit of \$15,000,000 in the aggregate provided through additional policy(s). **Model cars, boats, and rockets** are included. These limits are for claims occurring during the policy period. Coverage is provided only for accidents arising from the model activities.
 - Covers activities whether competition or sport Worldwide. FAI events outside of the United States and Canada are covered by a separate policy.
- There is no coverage for the member who is in violation of the AMA NATIONAL Safety Code when the injury or damage occurs. Also, there is no liability coverage for an AMA member-to-hisown-family (Household and Relative(s) living in the member's household) for claims or suits.
 - Is "excess" to any other applicable coverage, such as homeowner's.
 Has a \$250.00 deductible (property damage only).

Accident/Medical Coverage (Effective January 1, 2003)

The Accident/Medical coverage applies to injuries resulting from flying or model operations regardless of who causes the accident. It reimburses an AMA member in accordance with policy terms and conditions for only medical expenses (also the beneficiary for loss of life). The Accident/ Medical coverage works as follows:

- Provides up to \$25,000 for personal injury, and up to \$10,000 for dismemberment or death.
- Operates directly—does not require claim action by another person.
- Pays upon submission of bills or other documents certifying cost of treatment and that injury was caused by model operations.
- Reimburses medical expenses only after submission to any other health plan.
- Has a \$50.00 deductible.

Fire, Vandalism, and Theft Coverage (Effective January 1, 2003)

- Provides up to \$1,000 for loss of aircraft models and accessories, including RC equipment. All theft loss claims must be accompanied by a police report. NOTE: There is no coverage if theft was from a member's unlocked vehicle or dwelling. There must be signs of forcible entry.
- Has a \$100.00 deductible.
- Is "excess" to any other applicable coverage.

You need an AMA valid membership to be covered under this insurance and to fly at the club field.

AMA Dues for 2003 are \$58.00 per year for adults, Senior Citizen—\$48, Youth \$15, Youth (no magazine) \$1.
