The Prez Sez Terry & Sez Terrenoire



Well, that went pretty badly! All in all, I really did not introduce my idea very well at the last meeting. and I only sent it out as a teaser in the last Connector. The subject, you ask? Why the new roofing for the pavilions, of course! Since I had received a resounding "no response" from my repeated pleas for the past 6 months to have someone volunteer to be Field Chairman, I had an opportunity to get some ideas from a client who has nearly 10 years of selling and installing steel roofing, along with the more "conventional" roofing. What I did was simply get an opinion and preliminary cost estimate of this potential alternative. It turns out to have a cost of 3 times the rolled roofing, with about a 6 times life expectancy. This is also very close to the cost of a 30 year shingled roof, but with about 3 times the life expectancy.

Since Art seemed to be the only one in the room with years of experience installing all types of roofing, I am glad that he agreed to follow up on the various alternatives and I hope he will be able to give us a summary at the next meeting. He did call me at the Board meeting and told me that we could do the rolled roofing for both pavilions for about \$400. At this point my main concern is for the removal and disposal of the existing shingles from the main pavilion, if we choose to go this way. My second concern is for the members of the club who will have to do it all over again in 12 to 15 years.

One of the "objections" voiced at the last meeting was that we did not know how long we would be up there, and maybe it would not be another 10 or 15 years. That may be the case, but with a 50 history for this club, don't we want to plan long term? If the founders had not planned long term we never would have purchased the property in the first place. That long term planning began in 1958 with the purchase of our original 16 acres, then proceeded to the purchase of 68 acres in 1975, and then resulted in the purchase of an additional 24 acres in 1988.

Over and above our budget, we have put \$600 of receipts into our checking account in the past 2 months.

Historian Report

Paul Cushing (AGS club treasurer) sent me a note saying the AGS Photo CD's (includes all the photos taken in the years 2002 and 2003 and a copy of each month's Connector) were going like hot cakes at the last meeting and there are only a few left. The CD also includes photos other members gave me and has many more photos than the Club Photo album.

One thing I forgot to mention in the last connector is that the photos are organized in separate subdirectories for each year containing separate subdirectories for each club event. The *Connectors* are organized by year. This should make it easy to find the event photos or *Connector* you're interested in without having to look at hundreds of photos. Several of the photos even have descriptive names.

In case you're wondering how to view the photos: In Windows XP, use Windows Explorer to look at each subdirectory. Once in the subdirectory go to the view menu at the top of the window and turn on thumbnail. This gives you small thumbnail view of each photo on the CD. If you prefer to view them as a slide show highlight / select the photos you want in your slide show (*ed: Control-A will select everything*) then right click on the highlighted photos and select PREVIEW. Once in preview you can select Slide Show in the bottom of the screen or go through them one at a time manually with the arrows. Another program I like to use is Thumbsplus. If you have any questions give me a call.

If you missed out and didn't get one, this is a great way to remember the year and have a copy of each month's *Connector*. You can't beat the price of only \$5.00 and it will help the club out also. Club members are welcome to browse through the Club Photo Album at any time.

BTW the CD comes with a satisfaction guarantee. If for some reason the CD doesn't work in your PC, please let me know and I'll burn you a new one or we can give you, your money back.

New Business

Leader Club Status

Our status as an AMA Gold Leader Club was once more confirmed by AMA.

Pavilion Re-roofing

As mentioned in the President's Report, Terry noted that the roofs on both of the pavilions at our field were in need of replacement. He further stated that he had looked into the cost of metal roofing, which would make it unnecessary to do any roof maintenance in the future. He stated that the cost for metal roofing would be approximately \$700.00. In general, this suggestion was met with a negative reaction from the members present, who felt that the cost was too high. Most felt that ordinary shingles or roll roofing was more affordable. After some discussion, Art Riegal volunteered to get prices on having the roofing replaced with each of the three aforementioned materials.

Connector Distribution

It was noted that the cost of printing and mailing hard copies of the Connector each month amounted to an expense for the club of approximately \$700.00 per year – our largest single expense. Since distribution of the Connector by email is possible and is presently being done, the Board had suggested that those people who wanted to continue to receive a hard copy of the Connector be asked to pay \$12.00 per year to defray the expenses of printing and mailing.

A motion was made and seconded that members who currently receive hard copies of the newsletter, and who still wish to receive hard copies, must specifically request the hardcopy, or distribution to them will revert to email softcopy.

During the discussion, the following points were discussed:

Since many members did not want their email addresses to appear in email correspondence, it was suggested that Blind Carbon Copy (BCC), be used in the distribution list to hide email addresses.

Keep the current hard copy distribution and raise dues to cover the extra expense.

Put email distribution in image file format to prevent the information from being read by other programs.

A notice about the need to request continued distribution by hard copy will be printed in the next issue of the Connector.

The above motion was approved by a vote of 23 - 2.

Charlie Lecher showed a foam electric biplane which comes with an electric motor winder.

Dave Merithew displayed the March and April, 1964, issues of American Modeler, and the May and June, 1966, issues of American Modeler which contained plans for models by our own Dick Allen and Ralph Jackson. 


Our Golden Anniversary is Coming
