AEROBATIC PRIMER 2009

Several exciting changes have been made to the Annual AGS AEROBATIC PRIMER for 2009. To better support all the aerobatic pilots in the NSRCA District I this is now a TWO DAY contest, but as in the past it will be for 401, 402, and 403 ONLY! For the last several years this has been an AMA sanctioned contest. The best thing that hasn't change for 2009 is the morning ground school provided by AMA Hall of Fame Bob Noll. Several other aerobatic pilots will also be on hand.



Now to the good part, the flying! AMA has NOT issued a new set of maneuvers for the 2009/10 aerobatic season for Sportsman, Intermediate, and Advanced. The best way to get information about the sequences is to go to the National Society Radio Control Aerobatics' (NSRCA) website, www.nsrca.us. On the home page's left margin there is a title, "Judging Rules" click on it. On the next page in the center, near the bottom will be four links, one for each of the AMA competition classes. Click on your sequence and you will get a wonderful description of each maneuver for each class.

Lastly let me say I hope every member of the AGS comes to the primer. If you currently compete in AMA sanctioned contests as Masters, or FAI come as a judge and helper. Everyone else should come and fly. Bring your favorite airplane, the one you like to fly most often and the one you fly the best. I guarantee you will finish the day a better pilot. You may not come in first place, but you will be a better pilot. We all fly STRAIGHT and LEVEL, or so we think. That is the second maneuver in the Sportsman Sequence, right after TAKE OFF. Flying truly STRAIGHT and LEVEL takes a lot of skill. Come to the contest you will leave a better pilot. OH! Did I mention free food? Actually, it is not free, it is included in the entry fee of \$25.00, but for AGS members that fee is waved!

Show and Tell

Jordan Adams showed an AlignT-Rex 700 helicopter made from carbon fiber and aluminum. New engine 91HZ heli engine which yields about 4 HP. It runs on 30% nitro. The main blades are approximately 710mm. He has had 6 to 10 flights so far. One very useful upgrade is to change from a plastic mount to an aluminum mount. Bob Noll showed a BernzOmatic micro torch. It costs about \$45 to \$50. It is great for soldering landing gear. More information can be found at URL: http:// bernzomatic.com

Bob Balsie showed a Venom Pro Charger. It can charge LiPo, LiIon, A123, NiCad, NiMH. It have has many settings. And includes many safety features. It has a memory for five battery packs. It has charge, discharge, and cycle programs. It can be connected to a computer via a USB port to show charge and discharge curves. The manual is poorly done. One good feature is that it comes with an AC power supply. It has clip leads and 6 or 7 different adapters. It also has a temperature probe for safety. It can charge from 100mA to 5A. Jim Quinn showed a foam plane called the Rad Tad which is short for Radical Tadpole. The plan was in K-factor. It is made from fan folded foam. He has 8 flights on the plane. He built 3 of the planes. It is powered using a 2200 mAH LiPo battery pack. The hinges are made with clear duct tape.
