The V.P. Soap Box

October will be here soon and we all know what that means - time to elect a new slate of club officers! The AGS is facing some serious challenges in the next few years so the incoming Board of Directors will have its work cut out.

Officer candidates to date are:

These are our nominees at this point; other candidates are welcome for any position so that we can hold a meaningful election. As you can see, we are looking for a candidate for Treasurer, and potentially a club Secretary. The Board will be contacting some members in an effort to fill the nominations.

My own personal take on the state of the club is that we are fighting a myriad of problems, and (to use a cliché I usually dislike) we need to think outside the box if we are to survive. Some problems we cannot change, all we can do is adapt. The Southern Tier is an aging population. Large employers in the area are reducing their workforce, so we're not seeing an influx of middle class families moving in; quite the opposite, many are moving away. In the short term, I don't see the AGS returning to the number of members we had 10, 15, or 20 years ago. Our total roster is just over 40 members and effectively less than half are active fliers. Any new member we do get into the club should be made welcome and nurtured so that they have FUN and progress at a rate they are comfortable with; we can do much better at this than we currently do. We typically start 'encouraging' new members to help at all our many events both big and small; we need to put the emphasis back on *their* needs and not *ours*. From conversations I've had with former club members, the AGS's reputation is that we're 'elitist' - we must change that perception to survive in these challenging times. The general meetings should be streamlined and emphasis returned to airplane/equipment show & tells and programs. Our By-Laws are certainly due for a full refresh and if elected I'll lead that effort.

I also think we should consider scaling back our number of events (and corresponding workload expectations on club members) and return the emphasis to sport flying and camaraderie. We have enough workload already in maintaining our facility without adding to it. My views may be unpopular to some, but why continue to host several annual events that draw next to no one? I suggest we consider putting on only one modeler-oriented event per year, one that is well-advertised in advance to the RC community in the Northeast. How about trying something like hosting a Saturday-only warbird and fun-scale fly-in? Any fun scale or standoff scale model of any size, any means of power would be welcomed. The only other event I think we should run is Model Aviation Day or a similar community-oriented event. That's all - just two AGS event 'work' days a year.

The other main problem we face is financial, and we are not going to be able to solve the problem with a handful of new members every few years. Raising dues isn't viable; we couldn't raise them enough to make it meaningful and it would drive some current members away if we did increase them. I have some ideas that I will share in my next column.

** DISPOSAL OF LIPO BATTERIES **

Unlike NiCd batteries, lithium-polymer batteries are environmentally friendly. For safety reasons, it's best that LiPo cells be fully discharged before disposal (however, if physically damaged it is NOT recommended to discharge LiPo cells before disposal see below for details). The batteries must also be cool before proceeding with disposal instructions. To dispose of LiPo cells and packs:

- 1. If any LiPo cell in the pack has been physically damaged, resulting in a swollen cell or a split or tear in a cell's foil covering, do NOT discharge the battery. Jump to step 5.
- 2. Place the LiPo battery in a fireproof container or bucket of sand.
- 3. Connect the battery to a LiPo discharger. Set the discharge cutoff voltage to the lowest possible value. Set the discharge current to a C/10 value, with "C" being the capacity rating of the pack. For example, the "1C" rating for a 1200mAh battery is 1.2A, and that battery's C/10 current value is (1.2A / 10) can be used, such as a power resistor or set of light bulbs as long as the discharge current doesn't exceed the C/10 value and cause an overheating condition.

 For LiPo packs rated at 7.4V and 11.1V, connect a 150 ohm resistor with a power rating of 2 watts (commonly found at Radio Shack)to the pack's positive and negative terminals to safely discharge connecting it to an ESC/ motor system and allowing the motor to run indefinitely until no power remains to further cause the system to function.
- 4. Discharge the battery until its voltage reaches 1.0V per cell or lower. For resistive load type discharges, discharge the battery for up to 24 hours.
- 5. Submerse the battery into bucket or tub of salt water. This container should have a lid, but it should not need to be air-tight. Prepare a plastic container (do not use metal) of cold water. And mix in 1/2 cup of salt per gallon of water. Drop the battery into the salt water. Allow the battery to remain in the tub of salt water for at least 2 weeks.
- 6. Remove the LiPo battery from the salt water, wrap it in newspaper or paper towels and place it in the normal trash. They are landfill safe.

Airport Activities

The X-Mark mower is back and is working better than ever thanks to the tireless efforts of Frank Gioffredo.

Our storage facility is also looking better than ever, as well. That is thanks to John Carril who finished the staining, so it was looking so good for our Model Aviation Day.

Don Shugard made us alert to a mowing issue with the flail mower. "I was running the flail mower at the hose clamp on the runways. As I cut 12/30 I noticed what I thought was thatch from the X-Mark being tossed up. By the time I got to 6/24 I realized it was cutting too low. Not wanting to give the runway a reverse Mohawk I kept the same setting on the mower. Bob Jennings confirmed with a phone a call that he thought it was too low as well. I think the top link needs to have the end opposite the hose clamp turned out 5-6 turns."

It seems our grass runways are "Mohawked," to quote Don. Since the grass is so low it is hard to know what needs to be mowed and what is already low. Be sure to watch some areas that are growing faster than others so takeoffs and landings are smooth.

Thanks to everyone who helps keep our facility in such good shape!
